### When was your first introduction to the Dragon Run?

We met by phone or in the drug store or we went to the Dragon to do some tasks and then talked about the things that needed to get done.

### Favorite Memory?

It was awe inspiring the first time I paddled downstream from Mascot and came across the canal. Its human created but the trees have grown up along the banks and make it feel as if you are paddling through a tunnel. It is such a peaceful and magnificent place. There are so many wonderful places on the Dragon but the canal is a special place for me.

### Funny Stories?

It was a bit funny (looking back) when we moved the memorial stone for Jimmy Morgan to Big Island. We lashed two canoes together, set a piece of plywood in the middle and then placed the stone on top of the plywood. We were very cautious and worried we would lose the stone to the bottom of the Dragon. All went well till we beached on Big Island. The rock fell on the ground and started sliding into the mud. We stopped it from sliding with our legs (hoping it wouldn’t break the legs). Then we used two-by-fours to pry it out of the mud so we could tie a rope around it and pull it out. We all agreed that this was craziness; but, in the end what we did was very meaningful and worthwhile. David Clements single handedly built a bridge across the Dragon so that Jimmy’s mother could attend the ceremony. It was very nice.

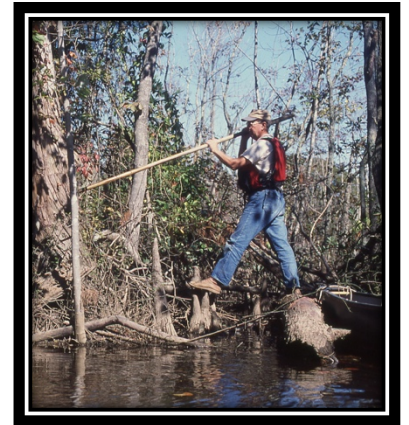


Ideas for Future Protection?
